

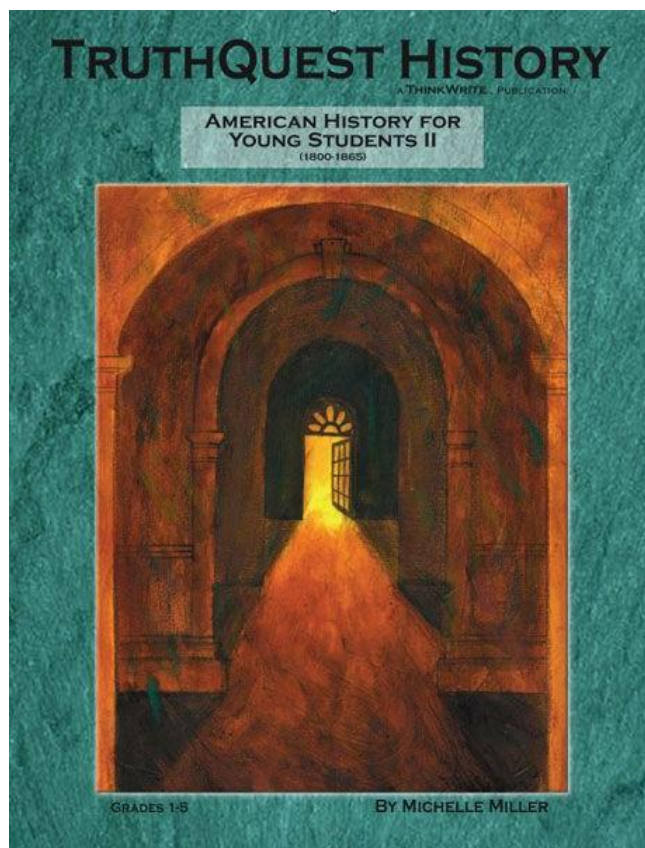

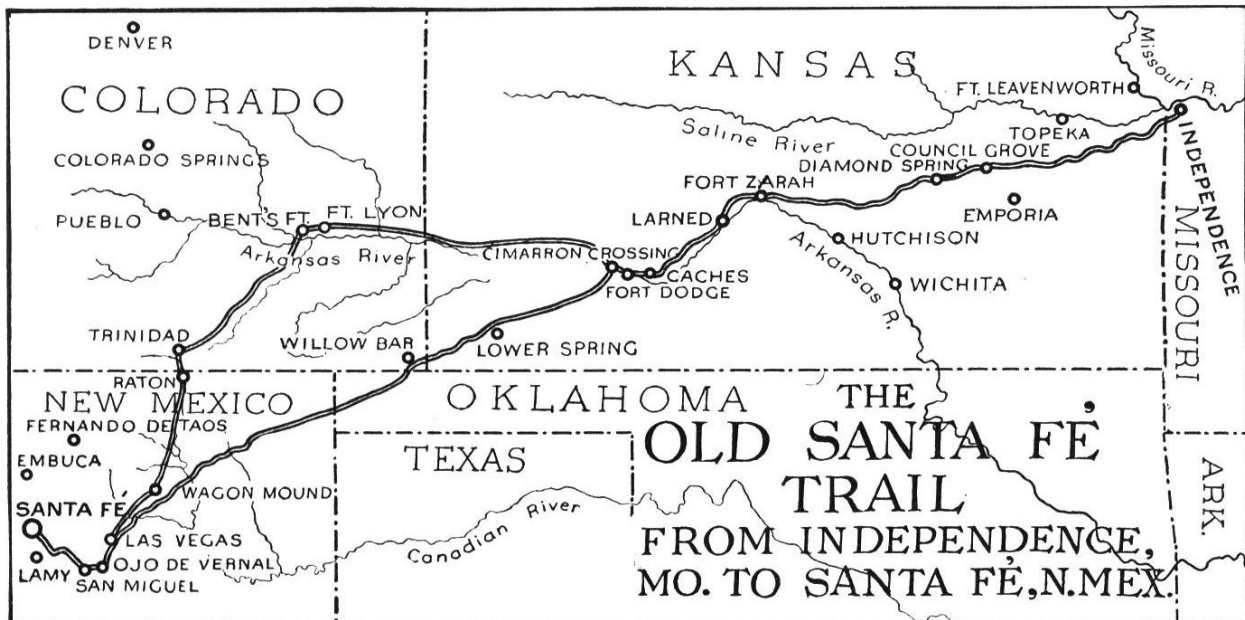

Make 3 copies of each page and do ALL 3!

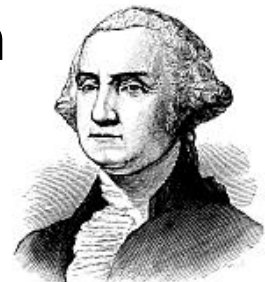
A document that describes the structure or plan of the government and the rights of the American people. Signed on September 17, 1787.

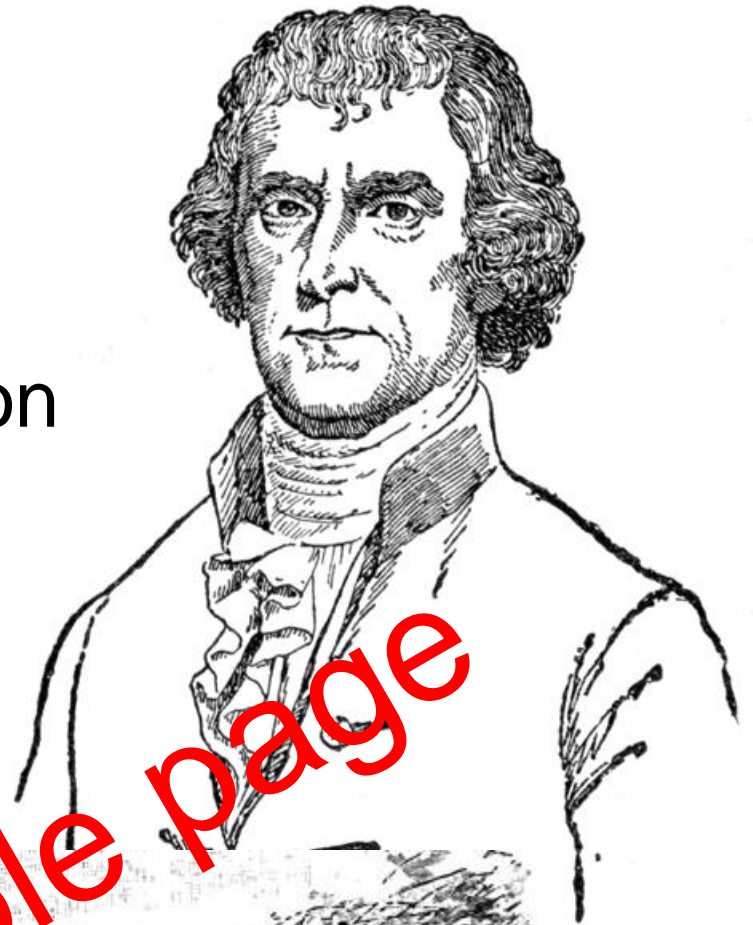

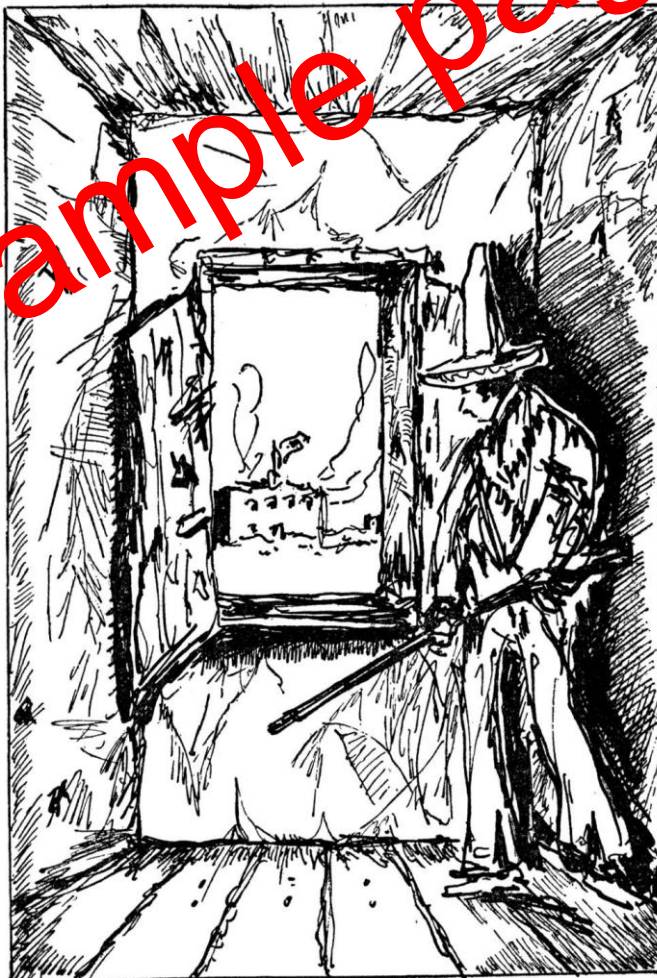

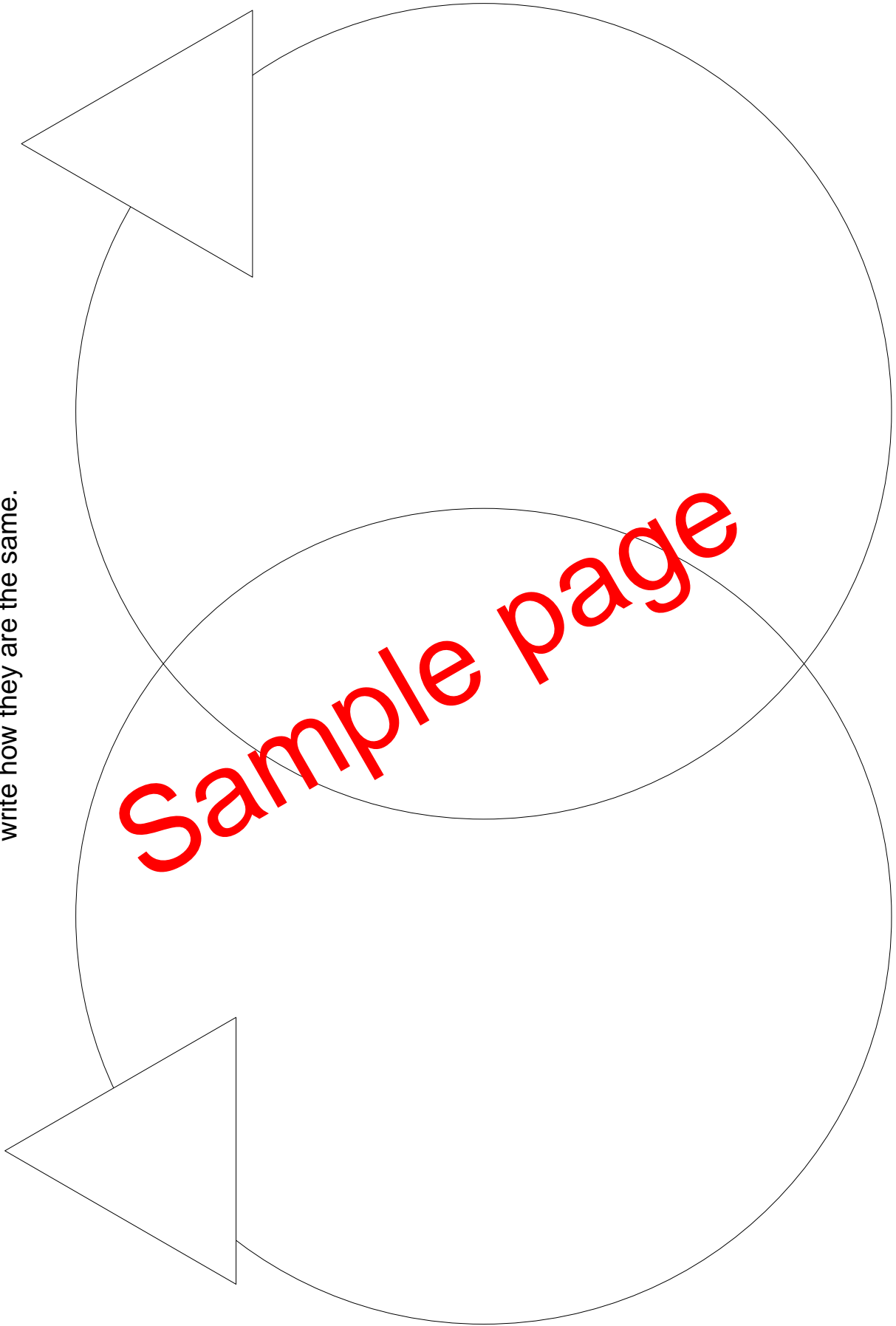
